


Strategies to Protect Vernal Pools in the Built Environment: Raising Awareness

Jens Jensen The Living Green

A Documentary Film Screening & Panel Discussion

Join NYBG on Earth Day, Wednesday, April 22, from 6:30-8:30 p.m. for the New York premiere of the award-winning film celebrating Danish-born Jens Jensen (1860-1951), a pioneering conservationist who rose from a street sweeper in Chicago to "dean of landscape architects." Half a century after his death, Jensen is now hailed as a pioneer of sustainable design, an early champion

of native species, and unsung American hero. After the screening, a panel will explore Jensen's work and its relevance to today's urban environmental issues.

Panel participants include: **Darrel Morrison**, FASLA, Professor and Dean Emeritus, College of Environment and Design (University of Georgia), **Bob Giese**, Professor of Landscape Architecture (University of Michigan), and Jensen scholar, **Carey Lundin**, documentary director, co-producer, and **Jensen Wheeler Wolfe**, film narrator and Jensen's great-granddaughter.
