Rhode Island Offers "Green" Turf Certification The Rhode Island Dept. of Environmental Management (RIDEM) now offers a Sustainable Turf Management Program to prevent pollution (P2) in the turf maintenance industry in Rhode Island. This sector includes landscapers; golf courses; cemetery caretakers; and municipal public works, parks, and recreation departments. The goal of P2 is to reduce sources of pollution.

The program is funded by an EPA grant and aims to promote reduced use of pesticides and fertilizers, increased water conservation and soil conservation, and greater green infrastructure. Under this program, landscapers can certify as green businesses by filling out of a checklist ([click for pdf](#)). The checklist is a self-certification document that allows DEM both to survey the industry on current pollution prevention and to promote greener practices, including organic land care principles and practices. MA Climate Action Tool in Development

Are you worried about the impacts of climate change on the wildlife, natural resources, or infrastructure you care about? Do you feel overwhelmed by the information available but still not sure what local actions you can take to help prepare for the changes ahead? Help the Massachusetts Division of Fisheries & Wildlife and the University of Massachusetts-Amherst develop a Fish and Wildlife Climate Action Tool that will identify climate change impacts and vulnerabilities and identify potential adaptation strategies to begin addressing these challenges. Take their [online questionnaire](#). The questionnaire has 24 questions and will take approximately 10-20 minutes to complete. The data collected will be aggregated for reporting and will not be used with personal/organizational attribution.

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
