Eastern Monarchs Flourish; Western Numbers Plunge?

According to World Wildlife Fund-Mexico, conservation efforts over the last 12 years have led to a rise in the number of eastern monarch butterflies hibernating in Mexico, as measured by the area of forest occupied.
